# The Trouble with Wealth

I remember reading a rather famous story about how wealth can be a great gift to us and that it can also be something that truly, literally "gets in our way." The story is told of a fabulously wealthy man who went to ask for help from a well know priest. The priest was well known for his innate wisdom and simplicity of life. So, the wealthy man visited with the priest and complained that despite his vast riches which allowed him to have whatever he wanted, he still felt miserable. He spoke about his frustrations for over an hour.

After an hour or so, the priest took the man to the window overlooking the street and asked, "What do you see?" The man replied, "I see men, women, and children. I see an

ordinary scene of life going on."

The priest then took the man to stand in front of a mirror and asked, "Now what do you see when you look into this mirror?"

The man said, "I see only myself."

The priest said, "In the window there is glass and in the mirror there is glass, and when you look through the glass of the window, you are able to see others, but when you look into the glass of the mirror you see only yourself. The reason for this is that behind the glass in the mirror is a thin layer of silver. When that silver got added to the glass, making it a mirror, you ceased to see others. You only saw yourself. That is why you became miserable."

So, whenever your devotion to money and material things becomes your reason for being, it is like silver added to glass. It blocks out others and keeps you looking only at yourself. If you seek true happiness, look beyond your wealth, look through it to see the people God has given to your care.

**Elementary** Secondary **Schools** and We strongly urge Catholic educators and administrators to create additional resources and programs that will address the lack of familiarity with Catholic social teaching among many faculty and students. We encourage diocesan and local educators to promote curriculum development in the area of Catholic social thought and would like to see a model developed for faculty interested in this arena.

#### A Pro-Life Prayer for Our President and Public **Officials**

Lord God, Author of Life and Source of Eternal Life, move the hearts of all our public officials, to fulfill their responsibilities worthily and well to all those entrusted to their care. Help them in their special leadership roles, to extend the mantle of protection to the most vulnerable, especially the defenseless unborn, whose lives are threatened with extermination by an indifferent society. Guide all public officials by your wisdom and grace to cease supporting any law that fails to protect the fundamental good that is human life itself, which is a gift from God and parents. You are the Protector and Defender of the lives of the innocent unborn. Change the hearts of those who

compromise the call to protect and defend life. Bring our nation to the values that have made us a great nation, a society that up hold's the values of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness for all. Mary, the Mother of the living, help us to bear witness to the Gospel of Life with our lives and our laws, through Christ, Our Lord. Amen

As October kicked-off with Respect Life Sunday on October 3<sup>RD</sup>, we are reminded that Jesus' ministry was to all the living, but especially the poor, sick, and marginalized. As Catholics, part of our care for life involves our opposition to the death penalty.

October 8<sup>TH</sup> to the 17<sup>TH</sup> has been designated *Death* 

Penalty Abolition Week.

Here is a request from the Social Action Office of the Archdiocese of Cincinnati:

"We're asking all parishes and Catholic communities to join people of faith across Ohio to stand in solidarity for abolition of the death penalty. Recognizing the injustices in our criminal justice system, we are unwilling to participate in the cruel and inhumane practice of sentencing our fellow neighbors to death. We join together across religious traditions calling in one voice for the abolition of the death penalty."

Pope Francis stated unequivocally in 2018, the death penalty is now "inadmissible." He ordered a change to that effect in the Catechism of the Catholic Church and said that Catholics must work for its abolition. In his 2020 encyclical Fratelli Tutti, Pope Francis grounded his opposition to capital punishment not only in mercy but also in opposition to revenge, stating: "Fear and resentment can easily lead to viewing punishment in a vindictive and even cruel way, rather than as part of a process of healing and reintegration into society."

Here are some facts about the death penalty in Ohio:

- Nationally, since 1973, more than 185 death row inmates have been exonerated of all charges and released.
- Ohio is home to 11 death row exonerees who collectively spent 216 years incarcerated for crimes they did not commit. For every five people Ohio has executed, one has been exonerated from death row.
- The death penalty appears to be applied unevenly based on race and geography. Ohio's death penalty system is continually used in just ten of 88 counties. As of Fall 2020, more than half (56%) of Ohio's death row comprise of people of color, even though they make up a very small fraction (15%) of Ohio's population.
